

Amelanchier utahensis

Havasupai: Amovale, Shoshone: Te'apin, N. Paiute: ti'gabui, Utah Serviceberry

H: 6'-15'

W: 6'-10'

Light: Full Sun

Water: Low - Moderate

Temperature: -20F

Foliage: Green

Flower: White

Native Range: Primarily grows Utah, Arizona, Colorado and New Mexico, but isolated pockets can be found across western North America from Washington to Baja California.

Description: Utah serviceberry - A handsome shrub that is native native to, but rare in, Eastern Washington. This waterwise plant offers some long-term visual excitement starting with late winter/early spring blooms. It's white flowers are rose-like in appearance, and eventually give way to blueberry-like fruit that lasts through the summer and into the fall. Once temperatures begin to drop, the leaves of Utah Serviceberry transform from green to eye-catching gold.

This is an excellent shrub for an edible xeriscape or bird friendly garden. Because *A. utahensis* has a tendency to form a thicket through suckers, consider using it to form a screen or informal hedge. *A. utahensis* needs a well draining site, and loves rocky soils.
